CONSTITUTION

As Amended at 1933 Session and 1943 Session

Article I.—NAME

The name of this body shall be Pulaski County Baptist Association.

Article II.—OBJECT

The object of this Association shall be to aid the churches in their divinely appointed work of spreading the Kingdom of God throughout the whole world by every Scriptural means.

Article III.—MEMBERSHIP

Section 1. This Association shall be composed of messengers from regular Baptist Churches, which are in sympathy with the principles and purposes of this Constitution and desire to co-operate with this Association, who shall be entitled to seats upon the presentation of letters from their churches or other satisfactory evidence of their appointment.

Section 2. Each church shall be entitled to three messengers, with one additional messenger for every fifty members or major fraction thereof above one hundred.

Section 3. Messengers from churches desiring to affiliate with this Association shall present to the Association petitionary letters or other evidence setting forth the Articles of Faith on which the churches were organized together with satisfactory evidence of the regularity of their organization. They shall be received into the Association only by unanimous vote as cast by the body.

Article IV.—AUTHORITY

This Association shall never exercise any legislative or ecclesiastical authority over any church, nor shall it in any way interfere with the rights and absolute independence of the churches of Christ.

Article V.—OFFICERS

Section 1. The officers of this Association shall be a Moderator, Vice-Moderator, Clerk and Treasurer, who shall be elected at the opening of each annual session by a majority of all the votes cast at such meeting. Provided, however, that the Moderator shall not be eligible to serve more than two consecutive terms.

Section 2. The Moderator shall preside at all sessions of the Association or call some one to occupy the chair temporarily in his absence, and may exercise the same privilege of discussion as any other member of the Association.

Section 3. The Clerk shall keep a correct record of all the proceedings of the Association and shall superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of each session as he may be directed by the Association.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all funds of every kind entrusted to his care, and shall disburse the same upon the order of the Association and shall make an itemized report of all such funds to the Association before the close of each annual session.

Article VI.—ASSOCIATIONAL BOARD

Section 1. The Associational Board shall be composed of one lay member, elected by each co-operating church, together with the pastors of such churches, and the officers of the Association and the Superintendents of W. M. U. work. Seven members of said Board shall constitute a quorum to transact business, after notice has been given all members of the Board of such meeting.

Section 2. This Board shall co-operate with the churches in this Association in informing and arousing the churches in gathering and disbursing of funds for all of the causes fostered by this Association and shall transact all of the business of the Association in the interim of the annual meeting of the Association.

Article VII.—MEETING

This Association shall meet annually on Monday night after the second Sunday in October at 7:30 o'clock.

Article VIII.

This Constitution may be amended at any annual session of the Association by a two-thirds vote of the messengers present at any annual meeting, provided that the substance of Article IV shall never be abrogated.

RULES OF ORDER (BY-LAWS)

As Amended at 1933 Session

- I. Each Session shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- II. The following shall be the order of exercises:
 1. Body called to order by the Moderator or, in his absence, by brethren in the following order of precedence: Clerk, treasurer, pastor of entertaining church.
 2. Devotional Service.
 3. Presentation of letters and the enrollment of messengers.
 4. Permanent organization.
 5. Introductory Sermon.
 6. Petitionary Letters.
 7. Reception of visitors, corresponding messengers from other bodies and introduction of new pastors.
 8. Appointment of program committee which shall recommend a schedule for all reports and other matters to come before the body, subject to the Association's approval.
 9. Appointment of committees as follows: (1) Association Missions; (2) State Missions; (3) Home Missions; (4) Foreign Missions; (5) Colleges and Schools; (6) Religious Literature; (7) Bible (Sunday) Schools; (8) Ministerial Education; (9) Orphans' Home; (10) Christian Stewardship; (11) Hospitals; (12) Woman's Work; (13)

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Young People's Work; (14) Digest of Letters; (15) Obituaries; (16) Resolutions; (17) Finance; (18) Temperance; (19) Nominations.

III. Every speaker shall rise and address the Moderator. In discussion all personalities shall be avoided. No one shall speak more than twice on the same subject, without special permission from the Association.

IV. Mell's Parliamentary Law shall be the standard in deciding questions of parliamentary practice.

V. The minutes of the preceding day shall be read and approved at the meeting of each morning session and at close of the Association meeting.

VI. Such offerings may be taken at the annual meeting of the Association as the body may direct.

VII. These by-laws may be amended at any regular meeting by a two-thirds vote of those present, or suspended by unanimous vote.

VIII. The Associational Board shall meet monthly at such time and place as the Board itself may determine.

IX. A doctrinal sermon shall be preached during each annual session at such an hour as each program committee shall provide.

X. The second night of the Association shall be known as B. Y. P. U. night, and a program planned accordingly in connection with Associational B. Y. P. U.

11. The morning session of the annual meeting began at 9 a. m., Tuesday, October 16, 1945, with the Moderator presiding. The messengers and visitors were led in a song service by Gale Dunn, who also led in prayer.

12. Pastor Joe Ingram led the morning devotional using Matthew 9:38 with the thought: "Lord, Teach Us To Pray—For Laborers." The devotional was closed with prayer.

13. Pastor W. T. King, Committee chairman of Petitionary Letters, presented a letter from the Crystal Valley Bap-

tist Church, Rt. 2, North Little Rock. This Church had recently organized, having been a mission of the Pike Avenue Baptist Church. Motion made that it be accepted into our Association and the messengers recognized as such. Seconded. Carried.

14. Report on Benevolent Institutions: Orphanage and Hospitals, was read by Pastor L. H. Roseman. Motion that report be adopted. Seconded. Carried.

REPORT OF BOTTOMS' BAPTIST ORPHANAGE

Considering the times, we have had a very good year—some sickness, but nothing serious: mumps, measles, chicken pox, and a few broken bones is all. There is very little change in the population since last year. The children did very good work in school; one girl graduated from High School. Our religious organizations remain standard: conversions, 10; baptisms, 10. Prospects for a good hay crop is about all we can say for the farming. It has rained too long and too much.

Our truck will not make the schedule as in former years. We will not need black berries, pickles, plums or green beans this year as we have sufficient quantity to supply our needs. The response to our Golden Anniversary in sending War Bonds to the Orphanage certainly has meant a lot in aiding the Home, and we suggest that this same method be continued by the churches, organizations, and individuals at Thanksgiving and Christmas special offerings to the Home. Make the bonds payable to Bottoms' Baptist Orphanage, Monticello, Arkansas, non-incorporated. Another way which will help to support your Orphanage is through the Co-operative Program. This is our main support.

The great example of praise in the Old Testament is David, and in the New Testament, Paul, with his constant, "I thank my God always on your behalf." "Remembering without ceasing your work of faith and labor of love and patience of hope in the Lord Jesus Christ." I Thessalonians 1:3.

BAPTIST HOSPITALS

Baptist State Hospital

During the year July 1, 1943 to June 30, 1944, the hospital rendered 83,071 patient days of service, an increase of 11,789 days over the previous year. Altogether, there were 10,258 patients treated.

The physical property of the hospital plant totals well over a million dollars. In addition, the Annex and Farm, which was bought during the past year, with the equipment and the stock, totals another \$60,000. During the year, there was some \$51,000 in charity allowances made, composed of cases that were total and complete charity, and many cases that we allowed very heavy discounts.

The hospital has increased its School of Nursing until we now have 199 student nurses. We believe that we are training not only one of the most splendid professions in the world but also a Christian education is being given. With the addition of the hospital pastor and chaplain, we believe that we have taken a long step forward toward such a goal.

The Woman's Auxiliary to the Baptist State Hospital, from July 1, 1944 to July 1, 1945, donated 2,668 pieces of linen, valued at \$800.34, fruits valued at \$747.67, miscellaneous gifts amounting to \$714.35. The charity fund had donations amounting to \$4,481.88, counting the Mother's Day-Hospital Day offering, making a total of \$6,744.24 in donations.

The demands on the hospital during the past year have been far and above anything we have ever known. We have had to turn away patients, from 25 to 30 a day, as we just did not have bed capacity to take care of them. We have crowded additional beds into wards that were never intended to take that many beds and we have taken private rooms and made double rooms out of them. There was a great increase in the number of babies born in our hospital.

We believe that it will be the will of the Baptists of Arkansas that we increase the bed capacity of our hospital to more adequately take care of the demands made upon us. We want to expand and enlarge the educational facilities of this institution. We believe that this can be satisfactorily done by some arrangements with Ouachita College. We still believe that the work of our denomination is carried out through the trinity of preaching, healing and teaching, and we believe that our institution here can play no small part in that program.

Southern Baptist Hospital, New Orleans Service in 1944

Work of the Hospital which is susceptible of tabulation indicates the following: We admitted 24,804 patients, and gave them 127,522 days of service. We gave 1,161 persons 14,987 days of free service at a cost of \$66,785.67 to the

Hospital. There were 2,688 births, and 5,542 emergency room cases which were not hospitalized. Forty-two young women were graduated from the School of Nursing, and 24 doctors completed their fifth year of medical training. Operating income was \$1,207,046.81; receipts from the denominational co-operative program were \$47,410.99; other gifts amounted to \$20,016.46, and interest received was \$638.59; thus giving us a total income of \$1,275,112.85 for the year. We paid all operating expenses, including the free work, paid \$154,757.46 on a new dormitory which will be completed in January; and \$2,268.90 on other capital expenditures; and closed the year with \$20,119.66 in bank.

Baptist Memorial Hospital, Memphis, Tennessee
July 1, 1944-July 1, 1945

The past year has been one of the very best in the 33-year history of the Baptist Memorial Hospital.

To the present date, we have admitted 387,000 patients, 21,250 of this number during the past 12-month period. In the same period, 13,300 operations were performed in our 14 operating rooms, and 1,440 births were recorded.

The Religious Department is striving to meet the spiritual needs of our patients and our student nurses. It has been a joy for the Chaplain to share with so many patients such decided experiences with Christ this year. Our student religious emphasis is strengthened and directed by the Baptist Student Union. Of our year's activities, our Student Revival, led by W. O. Vaught, pastor of Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas, was and is of paramount value. Noon Day Prayer Meeting, Y. W. A., Bible Discussion Groups, Weekly Chapel Service, Volunteer Band, and other directed activities have contributed further inspiration and training for our student nurses.

REPORT OF SUNDAY SCHOOL AND TRAINING UNION

The Sunday School organization for Pulaski County was led by Rev. Guy S. Wilson, Superintendent. This organization conducted four Associational meetings last year. The attendance at the meetings was very good. Training Schools for Teacher Training were conducted in a large number of the churches and a total of 967 awards were made for Teacher Training. There are 53 organized Sunday Schools in the County and twelve mission Sunday Schools, with a total enrollment of more than 12,000 in all schools.

The Training Union organization of the County conducted four meetings last year and a total of 1,177 Training Union awards were made. There are 30 Training Unions in the County with a total enrollment of more than 3,000.

MISSIONS IN PULASKI COUNTY ASSOCIATION

To the Pulaski County Baptist Association, meeting in the 30th annual session with the Immanuel Baptist Church, Little Rock, Arkansas.

Greetings:

The year of 1944-45 has been a good year in Pulaski County Association. Nearly all of the churches have conducted one or more revival meetings. The mission stations and chapels have all had meetings and in many instances Vacation Schools were held. We were not able to conduct a simultaneous effort at any time in the year, however, great stress was placed on evangelistic meetings in Spring and Summer.

The Executive Board of the Association met each month last year, with good attendance and a fine spirit. The work for the year of 1944-45 was planned by the Missions Committee of the Association and adopted by the Association in Annual session. The Executive Board in monthly meetings has greatly strengthened the work. A wonderful spirit of co-operation has prevailed.

The Superintendent of Missions, Rev. Taylor Stanfill, has established office at the Pulaski Heights Baptist Church, 2212 Kavanaugh, Little Rock. This office has been valuable in helping churches and pastors to make contacts. One function, not defined on the program of work, is that the Executive Board, through the office of the Superintendent of Missions,

should serve as a sort of clearing house for pastors and churches. Honest and prayerful consideration has been given in every way possible to help pastors and churches make spirit directed contacts. Every effort has been made to assist the churches in securing pastors. In no case, so far as is known, however, has the democracy and individuality of the church or churches been disturbed. We do not call pastors. We serve only as a contact medium.

In matter of promotion, honest effort has been made to promote the work of the Associational organizations. . . . Sunday School, Training Union and Woman's Missionary Union. These organizations conducted the monthly meetings. The attendance has averaged 200 or more for the 12 meetings. Conference, Fellowship and Inspirational messages featured the monthly meetings.

The co-operative program is one of the major things to be promoted by our Association. We are happy that the churches of Pulaski County gave nearly \$50,000.00 through the co-operative program last year and a fine thing about it is that more of our churches gave through the cooperative program than in previous year. We do hope to see all the churches contributing regularly through the co-operative program and to the Associational program.

Church-sponsored mission programs have done a good work. The Immanuel Church, Baring Cross Church, First Church and Pike Avenue Church have led the way in this field. Two new Mission Chapels were built—one at Amboy and one at Crystal Valley. One new educational building was erected by Immanuel at Bethany at a cost of more than \$4,000.00. The mission chapel at 7th street was enlarged. The average attendance in Sunday School, in the church-sponsored schools is around 500 per Sunday. Indications are that this phase of our work will be strengthened in 1945-46, as materials become available for new buildings and new work to be established.

The field is so large that all of us realize the impossibility of making one man available to all the needs of the county. It cannot be done. So, the churches have made themselves available to more than a dozen points and the Executive Board desires to offer pastors-supplement to assist any needy field in having a full time preaching ministry. The major emphasis in 1945-46 is pastor supplement. We have at the present time 8 or 10 fields that will not be able to have a full time preaching ministry unless the stronger churches "lend them a hand". To this end, the Executive Board will be happy if

you will put at least \$150.00 per month in your budget to supplement the salaries of the good men serving in smaller and needy fields. This not to be done to usurp the authority and democracy of the church, BUT to help them, where needed, in securing and keeping a full time preaching service. In some cases churches can be grouped, and in other cases, the group idea is not advisable.

Pray for the meetings of the Executive Board, and the monthly meetings of the workers. Pray for all committees and for one another, that the year before us will be a good year in winning lost people and in strengthening, edifying and building the churches.

RECOMMENDATIONS

The following items are suggested as program of work for the year of 1945-46 and we earnestly pray that you will accept these recommendations:

(1) Establish additional mission stations and chapels where possible and where needed. This to be done as church sponsored work. Strengthen the already existing mission stations and chapels in every possible way. Allow the Superintendent of Missions to give major part of his time to work with church sponsored missions and chapels.

(2) Where advisable look to the organization of new churches. Exercise wisdom here and not organize a mission chapel into a church, until there is sufficient strength in the local congregation to carry on without the assistance of the mother church. In some instances, fields like Oak Forest should become churches without the long process of growth as a mission chapel, etc.

(3) Co-operate with existing Associational Organizations. . . . Sunday School, Training Union and Woman's Missionary Union Organization. These organizations to sponsor and direct the monthly workers conference in order. In addition, allow the Missions Committee to direct, in connection with the Woman's Missionary Union, the monthly meetings—one time each quarter.

(4) Give every support to the Little Rock Extension School of the Baptist Bible Institute. More than 60 now enrolled. Urge all the pastors to attend and take advantage of this training.

(5) Conduct schools of missions. Bringing to our Association each year some of the representatives of our many

mission fields. Thirty churches will be reached in October, this year, with a missionary message. It is designated as World Mission Week.

(6) Promote Vacation Bible Schools and when possible and when available, use summer field workers in co-operation with Religious Education Department of State Convention.

(7) Supplement salaries of pastors in needy fields, enabling each church to have a full time preaching ministry.

(8) Promote the Co-operative Program in all our churches and urge each church to contribute regularly to the associational budget. It is hoped that each church will make the tithe of their total receipts as the minimum of their giving to missionary causes.

(9) Assist in every way possible in Evangelistic Campaigns, whether they be simultaneous, or central or individual. Give ourselves to special efforts in revival meetings. Each pastor should conduct at least one revival meeting each year in some needy field.

(10) Give our counsel and help, where possible, to Negro work. Especially in the field of Vacation Schools and to aiding the College (Arkansas Baptist College) in words of encouragement and in finances, enabling the college to become a standard and accredited college.

REPORT OF SOLDIERS' CENTER

No money of our State Convention is being spent for a more worthy cause than through our Soldiers' Center. Hope and comfort is given to the saved, and the Way of Life clearly shown the lost, is the major work of the Center; but all the graces of Christian living are offered by example by the many consecrated workers: workers from the churches assisting Brother Stockton and Mrs. Fisk. Now that Camp Robinson is on a peace-time basis, the boys having more time of their own, our opportunities and responsibilities have multiplied.

We can't say "the battle is done and the victory is won" and do justice to our high calling. The victory shall not have been won until the last "Johnnie comes marching HOME." The boys are more restless than ever before now that they feel they are having to train for something that will perhaps never come again. Almost all of the new inductees are boys just out of high school, perplexed as only such can be in their new environment while the returning veteran is anxious to pay the vow he made to God while yonder in that foxhole. Are we going to let them down now, when they are needing us most?

One day each week a group of ladies from various churches go from the Center to the Camp to alter clothing, make curtains, and do other sewing for our service men. Regular preaching services are held each Sunday afternoon at 3:45, many souls being saved and lives rededicated. At the close of the preaching service the WMS organizations of Greater Little Rock serve sandwiches and drinks. Supper is served each Wednesday evening at 6 P. M., after which all the boys are invited to attend a class in Bible study. All of the services are well attended and a lasting good is being done every day.

19. Report on Prohibition read by Pastor O. A. Greenleaf. Motion that report be adopted. Report spoken to by C. C. Coulter of the State Anti-saloon League. Pastor W. H. Hicks led in prayer that we might be able to overcome this great evil. Motion carried. An offering was taken at the close of the session to help finance this work.

ON TEMPERANCE

Arkansas and America continue on a drunken spree, steadily growing worse. The cost of liquors in 1944 reached an all-time high figure of seven billion dollars—\$54.00 for each man, woman and child in the nation. The nation's annual crime bill is estimated at fifteen billion dollars; and, at the lowest estimate, 40 per cent of that is caused by liquors. That means six billion dollars added to the price of the liquors, making the staggering total of THIRTEEN BILLION DOLLARS that booze cost America in one year.

Arkansas' loss in money spent for liquors, and in auto accidents, and in crime caused by liquors in 1944, was \$75,297,000.00. Therefore, each \$1 cost more than \$20.00! And yet the booze crowd have the nerve, (or the ignorance), to keep shouting, "We pay revenue!" They are brazenly insulting to all intelligence. They are more greedy than Judas Iscariot; they are more traitorous than Benedict Arnold.

The liquor crowd stand squarely against everything Christ and the Christian Churches stand for and work for and fight for and pray for. Therefore, every CHRISTIAN must be an enemy of the liquor traffic, and must vigorously combat it.

The FBI reports that in 1943, the number of girls under 21 years of age arrested throughout the nation for prostitution and other sex offenses increased 64.7% over 1942. And in 1944 there was a 6% increase in this same group over 1943. And boys under 21 years of age arrested throughout the nation in 1944 for those same offenses increased 14.2% over 1943. And these are FUTURE AMERICAN FATHERS AND MOTHERS! Truly the liquor traffic is playing havoc with the youth of the nation, and what a price future generations must pay for it!

Twin scourges are ALCOHOLISM and VENEREAL DISEASE. Science knows three racial poisons—white lead, and alcohol, and syphilis. Any case of lead poisoning is accidental. Both the others are taken VOLUNTARILY. And top-ranking medical men state that about 80% of cases of venereal diseases are contracted while the victims are intoxicated. These TWIN SCOURGES are undermining the physical, mental and moral health of America; they are working like termites, eating out the very foundation of American life; they are destroying body, mind and soul of countless VICTIMS. The booze racket is making moral and spiritual COWARDS of millions of our citizens. The situation is de-

plorable, disgraceful, and TERRIBLY DANGEROUS. Every person who hears these words should REDOUBLE efforts to REGAIN for our state and the nation the CHARACTER of CITIZENSHIP that made us strong.

LOCAL OPTION ELECTIONS in Arkansas: Under our new local option law, 22 county-wide elections have been held, and the drys won 19 of them. Besides, Sebastian County is dry, except Fort Smith District. Besides, 16 townships and nine towns are dry. And other counties are now in the midst of such campaigns, with good prospects of driving booze out. Arkansas is GOING DRY. Kentucky has 120 counties, and 88 of them are now dry. Throughout the nation the drys are driving the wets back, wherever the Christian forces have got on the job. Come on, Arkansas Christians, the tide is turning because HARD WORK and PRAYER are TURNING it. Every Christian should help and be grateful for the privilege. Let each one do his or her very best against the liquor traffic. We take courage and PRESS FORWARD.

21. Pastor W. H. Ryan of Jacksonville brought the Annual Sermon, using Judges 16:18-20 and I Cor. 9:27—"The Castaway Christian." A very timely and powerful message on a Christian losing his power to witness.

22. Adjourned to a delicious lunch in the basement of the Church, served by the membership of the Immanuel Baptist Church.



SECOND DAY

Tuesday, October 16, 1945

Afternoon Session—1:30 P. M.

23. The afternoon session was called to order by the Vice-Moderator, Pastor W. O. Vaught, Jr. Pastor C. E. Stewart led the song service. Rev. Ray Branscum led in prayer.

25. Report of State, Home, and Foreign Missions was read in part by Pastor W. O. Vaught, Jr. Motion that report be adopted. Chaplain Aubrey Hawsell spoke to the report, and Chaplain Smith of Georgia was introduced. Report adopted.

**REPORT OF
STATE, HOME AND FOREIGN MISSION REPORT TO
PULASKI BAPTIST ASSOCIATION
Little Rock, Ark., October, 1945**

STATE MISSIONS

The past year has been a good year for State Missions in Arkansas. We now have five State Missionaries on the field. We also have 36 men who are doing associational mission work; some of these men are special missionaries in destitute sections.

The State Convention put into its budget \$40,000 for State Missions for this year. Thirty-three associations now have missionaries. Besides this, we are placing in certain destitute counties a special missionary to work among the churches which have no pastors.

The Home Mission Board is cooperating with the Arkansas Baptist Convention in doing Rural Mission work. This Board is paying a part of the salaries of our five State Missionaries. Dr. Otto Whittington was elected Superintendent of Rural Missions and came on the field January 1, 1945.

We are continuing our work in concentration centers for both soldiers and war workers. Our Soldiers' Center in Fort Smith has been discontinued, but the one in Little Rock is still being operated, with Rev. P. A. Stockton and Mrs. J. L. Fisk in charge.

Home Missions Looking to the Future

1. The Unchurched

There are 25,000,000 unchurched people in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention and at least 12,000,000 in Home Mission fields in Cuba, Panama and Central America. If the unchurched, the spiritually stranded souls in the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention, were placed in states the size of Mississippi, they would fill ten states.

2. The Foreigners and Indians

There are 1,500,000 Mexicans and Spanish-speaking people and only 15,000 Baptists; that is, one to every one

hundred. There are 400,000 French in southern Louisiana, with only 4,000 Baptists; one to every one hundred; 600,000 Italians, with less than 2,000 Baptists; 7,000 Chinese, with about 500 Baptists; 250,000 Indians, with about 12,000 Baptists, with many thousands in New Mexico and Arizona as pagan as they were when our fathers settled this country. There are sixteen pueblos in New Mexico without a missionary.

3. The Cities

Sixty per cent of the population of our cities are unchurched. In the south as a whole one out of every 8.6 people is a Baptist, but in our cities only one out of every 34 people is a Baptist. In the sixty largest cities in our territory there are 13,000,000 people and 7,800,000 of these are unchurched.

4. The Rural Sections

Five thousand Baptist churches in the country have fewer members than they had ten years ago. Six thousand, three hundred had no conversions last year. Three thousand are without pastors. Four thousand gave nothing to missions.

5. The Mountain Sections

In the mountain sections of the territory of the Southern Baptist Convention there are 2,300,000 people. Seventy per cent of these are unchurched. Baptists are the strongest denomination and yet they number only about one to 37 in the mountain sections.

6. Cuba and Central America

In Cuba, Panama, and Central America where we are at work, there is a population of something like 12,000,000, with only 6,000 Baptists, one to every two thousand people. We have one missionary, including the wives of workers, to 92,000 people, and one church for 160,000 people.

7. The Negroes

Our mission work among the Negroes needs to be doubled and trebled. We are now working with the ministers, furnishing Bible teachers in colleges and holding institutes for the preachers who are not attending college. We have Bible departments in nineteen of their colleges. We are holding institutes in cooperation with the state organizations in the various states. Last year we contacted from 10,000 to 12,000 Negro preachers.

8. Enlarging the Work

During the past year, the Board added 153 missionaries to its force, opened 82 mission stations, acquired 54 pieces of

mission property. During the year the missionaries distributed over 29,000 Bibles, Testaments, and portions of the Scripture. They gave out more than 1,900,000 tracts; they delivered over 53,000 sermons and addresses; they led more than 15,000 people to Christ, and received into the fellowship of the churches 11,911 members. The Board employed during the year 654 missionaries who preached the Gospel to the Indians, Mexicans, Spanish-Americans, the Jews, the Italians, the French, the Cubans, the Chinese, the Russians, the underprivileged in the crowded industrial sections and slums of the cities in forty of the great cities in the territory of our Convention, in rural work in cooperation with thirteen state mission boards, to the millions of Negroes in the homeland, the men in the army camps, and in Cuba, Panama, and Costa Rica.

Foreign Missions

Southern Baptists now have approximately 540 active missionaries under appointment, one to every ten thousand Baptists in our membership. We are averaging a little above fifty cents per capita for foreign missions: Can we call ourselves Missionary Baptists when our response in life and money is so meager and so insignificant in comparison with the blessings we have received?

We need at once 300 new missionaries, to say nothing of replacements. Nigeria is calling for forty new missionaries. We could profitably place one hundred additional missionaries in Latin America without any enlargement of the present undertaking. Think of one great state in Brazil, twice the size of Texas, with one missionary couple and less than a dozen Baptist churches. An entire permanent staff must be provided for the Hawaiian Islands.

Then, try to visualize the reinforcements we must send to the Orient. The nearly two hundred missionaries at home from the Orient, most of whom are busy in schools and missions and speaking engagements over the South, will be returning to the Orient when the conflict ceases in the Far Pacific area. A few, because of age or physical disability, will be unable to continue in active service. We should have at least 150 new missionaries for the Orient. We call upon Southern Baptists to pray the Lord of the harvest that he will thrust laborers into the harvest field. May a multitude of young people hear the call of God and make reply, "Here am I, Lord, send me!"

Mr. E. P. Buxton, Treasurer, reports that our income for the year 1944, exclusive of relief funds, amounted to \$2,747,207, with an increase of \$333,256 for the first quarter

of 1945 over the corresponding period last year. The Lottie Moon Offering reached a total of approximately \$950,000.

What are the urgent financial needs of the Foreign Mission Board?

First, we must provide for our current budget which in 1945 amounts to approximately \$2,500,000. This is made up of about \$1,300,000 appropriated by the Board from Co-operative Program receipts, \$900,000 from the Lottie Moon Christmas Offering and some \$300,000 of designated funds.

Second, we must provide funds for replacing destroyed mission property and equipment now the war has ended. We cannot determine now the full cost of rehabilitation, but we should provide as soon as possible not less than \$2,000,000 for this purpose.

Third, we should create now an emergency reserve fund to be used only under circumstances which will compel us to borrow money from banks if we do not have such a fund. An emergency reserve fund is as urgent as is the fund to rebuild destroyed property, because without it we cannot safely project a long-range, world-wide, missionary program. For this purpose we should have \$2,000,000.

Fourth, we must have money to finance the growth and development of the Baptist groups which we have helped to found in nineteen countries abroad and for the enlargement of our program to meet postwar opportunities. Not less than \$3,000,000 should be provided for this imperative missionary advance.

THE COMMISSION, E. C. Routh, Editor-in-Chief, and Miss Marjorie Moore, Managing Editor, has had a net increase of fifty per cent in circulation during the past two years. The present circulation is approximately 72,500. Many churches are placing THE COMMISSION in their church budget on the same basis as the state papers and Sunday school training and teaching literature, with magazines mailed to individual addresses and payments made monthly if preferred. This is the most practicable plan for giving Southern Baptists information concerning world missions.

Miss Nan Weeks, Book Editor, and Miss Mary M. Hunter, Manager of Literature and Exhibits report mission study courses for 1945 with worth-while studies not previously presented. Among them are *Latin-American Pilgrimage*, by Everett Gill, Jr.; *The Apostle of the Chilean Frontier*, by Elizabeth Condell Pacheco; *Go Ye*, by O. T. Binkley; *Neigh-*

bors *Half-A-World Away*, by Margaret Stroh Hipps; Junior book, *How It Began*, stories of beginnings of foreign work; *Make-Believe Visits*, for younger children, a compilation describing work among children in five different mission fields. We still face the problem of reduced paper quotas. Dr. George W. Paschall is working on the history of the Foreign Mission Board, and we hope to have that ready for publication early next year.

The need for missionaries for critically undermanned mission stations is appalling. The regular staff has been cut down considerably by death, ill health, and retirement. The reduction of qualified missionary candidates by the war effort is alarming. The Personnel Secretary, Dr. J. W. Marshall, has made urgent appeals to Baptist Student Union Secretaries, Young Woman's Auxiliary leaders, and other youth workers throughout the South, also to our colleges and universities throughout the South. The cooperation of state teachers colleges has been sought in an effort to find qualified candidates for lifetime appointment, and for contract teaching positions. Preachers with experience are needed for pioneer work. Doctors, both men and women, and nurses to superintend hospitals, clinics, and schools of nursing, are in great demand. Teachers for seminaries, Bible schools, colleges and universities, high schools and grade schools, are wanted at once.

The Foreign Mission Board has produced recently a professional film, entitled, "An American Mission." This film highlights some of the thrilling episodes in Southern Baptist missionary history during the past one hundred years. The original film was made in professional size—35 millimeter. Many prints have been made in 16 millimeter. These are available for showing to large or small groups in theaters, convention halls, churches, or schools. Requests for this film should be directed to the Foreign Mission Board.

REPORT OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The program of Christian education among Arkansas Baptists has three distinct divisions:

First, the educational program of the local church, which includes the Training Union, the Sunday School and the Vacation Bible School, and may also include week-day religious education. According to the Great Commission, the work of teaching immediately follows that of preaching, and is of primary importance in the work of the church. Our educational program heads up in the Department of Christian and Missionary Education, with Dr. Edgar Williamson, Secretary.

Second, the work represented by our colleges and seminaries. In Arkansas the Baptists have good colleges:

Ouachita College, Arkadelphia, Arkansas, is a standard four-year college. It is a member of the North Central Association. The enrollment last year reached 500. During the past year Ouachita has trained 125 ministers and almost as many others who plan to do work as missionaries, church secretaries and educational directors. Those interested should write President J. R. Grant, Arkadelphia, Arkansas.

With the close of the war Ouachita looks forward to an enrollment of 1,000 students as soon as rooms can be provided.

Central College is an accredited Junior College for girls, a member of the North Central Association and The American Association of Junior Colleges. The school is also accredited by the Arkansas State Department of Education.

Central College emphasizes the cultural values of life. All students are encouraged to study music, art, or dramatics. No additional charge for private lessons in these fine arts.

In addition to the regular work of the first two years of college, Central gives vocational foundations for such careers as: Homemakers, Secretaries, Nurses, Religious Workers, Air Line Hostesses, and Teachers. Write President Edwin S. Preston, Conway, Arkansas.

Southern Baptist College, Pocahontas, Arkansas, is a new institution recently recognized by our State Board. This school was begun and has continued as a training opportunity for Christian young men and women. It seeks to maintain the highest Christian standard and looks forward to increased usefulness in our state.

We help to support three Seminaries: Southwestern Baptist Seminary in Fort Worth; Southern Baptist Seminary in

Louisville; and the Baptist Bible Institute in New Orleans. These Seminaries are training Preachers, Missionaries and other Christian workers. They are crowded all the time, and are turning away many applicants. We also help to support the Negro Seminary in Nashville, Tennessee.

The Little Rock Extension School of the Baptist Bible Institute was begun in the First Baptist Church of North Little Rock this fall. It has an enrollment of 65, of whom 21 are preachers. The purpose of this school is to supplement the training of men who have not enjoyed the advantages of full seminary work. This extension school bids fair to increase in usefulness and importance.

Third, the Baptist Book Store. Our Book Store, located in Little Rock, is one of our real educational assets. Through the efficient management of Miss Blanche Mays, all denominational supplies are available, religious books for ministers and Christian leaders, and the best in recreational and inspirational literature for all. As Arkansas Baptists, we may well be proud of these institutions and loyal in our support of them.
