# Proceedings.

FLAT CREEK, October 5, 1901.

The Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association convened in its fifty-first annual session this day with Flat Creek church, at 10 o'clock a. m.

Eld. N. C. Denson, moderator, called the house to order and opened the service by reading Romans 12, and leading in prayer.

The business of the association began with the reading

of the Rules of Decorum by the former clerk.

The moderator then proceeded to call the roll of churches, requesting Dr. W. H. Lindsey and D. W. Clements to read the letters as they were handed in. (For list of churches and delegates see appendix.)

At 11 o'clock the call of churches was discontinued and Eld, E. C. Faulkner proceeded to preach the annual introductory sermon from Proverbs 3: 9-10. At the close of the sermon the body took recess for dinner, being dismissed by Eld. J. W. Sims.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reassembled at 1:30, and after devotional exercises the call of churches was resumed and continued to a finish, W. C. Harley taking the place of D. W. Clements in reading the letters.

Permanent organization was then effected by electing Eld. J. W. Sims moderator and J. M. L. Thomasson clerk. The retiring moderator, Eld. Frank Wells, presented the association with a gavel made from a tree cut on the Mount of Olives, which was gratefully accepted. The officers elect, as well as the retiring moderator, made short speeches, expressing gratitude to God and thanks to the brethren for their confidence and love.

The moderator elect announced a Committee on Arrangement for preaching as follows: J. C. Pyron, A. F. Willis and N. C. Denson.

A call for corresponding messengers and visitors was responded to by Eld. J. S. Thomas, who came representing the Arkansas Baptist, and Eld. R. C. Medaris, who came representing the state mission work. Bro. Floyd, of Louisiana, was also present.

The moderator asked time to appoint the regular committees, and while doing so called Eld. W. C. Harley to the chair, and Brethren Thomas and Medaris were given an opportunity to represent their different interests. The moderator then announced the appointment of the following committees:

Associational Missions-W. C. Harley, R. C. Dew and A. F. Willis.

State Missions-J. C. Pyron, N. C. Denson and M. D. Parker.

Sunday Schools-H. A. Munn, Henry Berry and J. C. Stell.

Foreign Missions—E. C. Faulkner, J. W. Creed and J. H. Byrd.

Ministerial Education—John X. Smith, H. S. Brooks and J. H. Riley.

Orphans' Home—E. C. Faulkner, G. M. Peters and Jno. X. Smith,

Publications—T. G. Morgan, A. B. Turner and J. C. Stell.

State of Religion-N. C. Denson, E. T. Mitchell and W. H. Daniels.

Finance-W. S. Allen, D. W. Clements and B. P. Kimbro.

Obituaries-N. C. Denson, A. F. Willis and Clarke Sims.

The Committee on Arranging Preaching reported as follows: Preaching at the Baptist church tonight by J. S. Thomas; at the Methodist house tonight, Jno. X. Smith; at the school house tonight, F. G. Morgan; at Shilo church tonight, A. F. Willis; at this house tomorrow 11 a. m., Jno. X.

Smith to preach the annual missionary sermon; at the arbor 11 a. m. tomorrow, R. C. Medaris; at this house 3 p. m. tomorrow, W. T. Clements; at this house 7:30 p. m. tomorrow, W. C. Harley.

This report was adopted with the addition, Sunday School mass meeting in the morning at 9:30 led by Eld. J. S. Thomas. The Committee on Sunday Schools being requested to have their report ready for consideration at that hour.

Orphans' Home mass meeting at 1:30 p.m. The Committee on Orphans' Home to report in this connection.

Eld. N. C. Denson offered a motion, which was carried, to the effect that the collection at the house tomorrow be for associational missions and one at the arbor for state missions.

The body then adjourned until 7:30 this evening, being dismissed by Eld. N. C. Denson:

#### EVENING SESSION.

At 7 o'clock the congregation assembled and joined in song and prayer service for 30 minutes, after which Eld J. S. Thomas occupied the stand and preached an acceptable sermon, and quite a number arose in the congregation asking for prayer.

Adjourned until tomorrow. Dismission by E. C. Faulkner.

#### SUNDAY-MORNING SESSION.

Met at the appointed hour and spent 30 minutes in song and prayer service. At 9:30 Eld. J. S. Thomas opened the Sunday School mass meeting.

After the reading of the report of the Committee on Sunday Schools there were five-minute speeches from brethren as follows: J. M. L. Thomasson, subject, "The Sunday School Superintendent;" E. C. Faulkner, subject, "Relation of Parents to the Sunday School;" A. F. Willis, subject, "Music in the School;" N. C. Denson, subject, "Sunday School Entertainment." At the close of the meeting a collection was taken for state Sunday School work and amounted to \$5.82. Dismissed by W. T. Clements.

Reassembled at 11 o'clock at the church house and Bro. Jno. X. Smith proceeded to preach the annual missionary sermon from the words, "What Shall I do With Jesus." After the sermon a collection was had for associational missions amounting to \$9. At the same hour Eld. R. C. Medaris preached at the arbor and took collection for state missions to the amount of \$23, after which adjourned for dinner.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

At 1:30 the congregation met at the house in mass meeting in the interest of the Orphans' Home, and the Committee on Orphans' Home presented the following report:

The main building will be completed in a short time. Pipe has been laid and the home bountifully supplied with pure water. The bath rooms have been furnished with three large tubs and a supply of hot and cold water. Seats have been ordered for the chapel, and soon everything for the comfort of the children will bave been done, so far as the building and rooms are concerned. But these children must be fed, clothed and educated, all of which takes money. In your benefactions do not forget our orphans; they are 48 in number; and dependent on us for the necessaries of life.

### The secretary of Mission Board presented the following:

Your Mission Board, in compliance with expressed wish and direct instructions of the association, continued Eld. Jno. X. Smith in the field as associational missionary. We also secured the services of Eld. H. A. Munn as Sunday School missionary and colporter. At our board meeting the fifth Sunday in June we found that our treasury was empty, and so had to discontinue the work of both these men, and since then no work has been done. The report of their work is as follows:

Jno. X. Smith traveled 2,300 miles, preached 114 sermons, visited and addressed 34 Sunday and Literary Schools, made 341 religious visits and 7 visits to the sick, conducted 6 prayer-meetings, received into the church by letter 9, collected for associational missions \$88.75, for state missions \$10.40.

H. A. Munn sold 121 books, preached 26 sermons, visited 157 families, traveled 605 miles, made 30 addresses and organized 13 Sunday Schools, collection on field and from sale of books \$39.42.

We have settled in full with Bro. Smith but are still due Bro.

Munn \$23.85.

This was adopted and amount due H. A. Munn ordered

paid.

The Committee on Associational Missions made the following report:

We would urge the importance of supplying the destitution in our bounds with the pure gospel of Christ. Your Mission Board, by instructions of this body at its last session, continued Eld. Jno. X. Smith as missionary, who held regular appointments at Wilmar, Johnsville and other points until the fifth Sunday in June, when the work was discontinued for want of funds. We recommend that the present board be continued and that they be instructed to secure an efficient man as missionary for all of his time to supply the destitution made greater by a growing population. We earnestly recommend to the messengers and especially the pastors, that they urge upon their churches the importance of making generous contributions quarterly for associational missions. Brethren, it is a burning shame that we have not a consecrated man in the field giving his full time to this work. We can have one if we will. Let us take steps now looking to the supplying of this great need.

Resolved, That this association invite the American Baptist Publication Society to put a colportage and Bible wagon in our territory, and that Eld. J. S. Thomas be requested to aid us in securing the same.

The Committee on State Missions made a majority and minority report as follows:

The majority report is as follows:

Your committee notes with much pleasure the fact that a great work has been accomplished this year by our State Convention and its Mission Board, and we recommend a hearty co-operation with the convention in all of its work. But in view of the wide-spread dissatisfaction over the state we recommend that this body instruct its delegates to the State Convention to vote to abolish the office of corresponding secretary and favor a state evangelist who shall labor on the mission field after the manner that Dr. White has labored this year, also to meet with the State Board and aid in carrying forward the work.

The minority report is as follows:

State mission work and workers: One corresponding secretary, 2 general missionaries, 10 associational missionaries, 20 missionary pastors. Work done for the three quarters ending August 1: Sermons preached, 2,839; conversions, 931; baptisms, 477; additions to the churches, 983; churches organized, 8; Sunday Schools organized 21; church houses built and in course of construction from 10 to 15. Our cause has been established in many centers of influence and in several rural districts. Our missionaries have collected the following sums for the purposes named: Church buildings, \$5,052.75; associational missions, \$427.20; state missions \$562.60; home missions, \$241.20; foreign missions, \$251.79; Sunday School and colportage work, \$74.73; Orphans' Home, \$4.05; ministerial education, \$7.50; total, \$6,621.92. This does not include any of the work done by the superintendent, and but one month's work done by Dr. White, one of the general missionaries. Some of the churches we are now helping will not only be selfsupporting after this year but will be large contributors to our denominational work. We can safely say that when the reports are all in that they will show over 1,000 conversions and above 1,000 additions and beyond 600 baptisms. But there is much work in our beloved state to be done. Twelve or more county seats and as many more important towns where we have a small struggling church or none at all and without a house of worship, and these should be accepted at once. Brethren, would it not be unwise to change plans at this important time? Would it not be better for us to unite in thanksgiving to a gracious Heavenly Father for his past blessings and heartily co-operate in the future, striving together with one mind, in one spirit for N. C. DENSON. the faith of the gospel?

A motion to adopt the majority report was substituted by a motion to adopt the minority report. Quite a warm discussion was entered into by J. C. Pyron and J. S. Thomas in favor of the majority, and N. C. Denson in favor of the minority report. Pending discussion the body took recess for dinner.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Reassembled at 1 o'clock, and after singing and prayer the discussion was continued by R. C. Medaris on the one side and W. S. Allen, J. M. L. Thomasson, G. M. Peters and others on the other side. The minority report was voted down and the majority report adopted; the statistical part of the minority report being made a part of the majority report.

The minority report received 8 votes. The vote on the majority was not counted but was very large.

The Committee on Nominations reported as follows:

We recommend as members of the Mission Board

For Drew County-J. M. L. Thomasson, W. C. Harley and J. R. Wallace.

Ashley County—J. W. Sims, S. R. Smith and A. F. Willis. Bradley County—W. T. Clements and A. V. Johnson.

We recommend as a Board of Ministerial Education, J. M. L.

Thomasson, J. W. Sims and W. T. Clements.

We recommend Enon church in Drew county as the place for our next annual meeting, and Eld. A. F. Willis to preach the introductory sermon, T. G. Morgan, alternate. N. C. Denson to preach the annual missionary sermon, H. A. Munn, alternate.

We recommend as delegates to the State Convention, J. W. Sims, G. D. Moore, W. C. Harley, T. G. Morgan and W. T. Clements, and

that J. W. Sims be made our member on the State Board.

We recommend as delegate to the Southern Baptist Convention,

N. C. Denson, and W. C. Harley as alternate.

This report adopted as read. Committee on Home Missions reported as follows:

This is one of the most important fields over which we should exercise our best efforts in money and talent. We should send the gospel to the destitute points in all the Southern States, Mexico, Cuba and the mountain regions also the frontier section. The destitution is appalling. Thousands of foreigners are coming among our people who should and must have the gospel if we would prevent Romanism and other heresies from controlling the great masses of our beloved Southland. We therefore recommend to the churches that they give home missions an equal place in all our regular contributions. We also recommend that our pastors preach at least one sermon during the year on the subject of home missions and urge their churches to make contributions to this work. We see that Romanism is encroaching on our own associational territory, so you see the need of action on our part and at once.

We find reported from 38 churches, 237 baptisms, 125 received by letter and 46 restored. Decrease, 48 deaths, 105 dismissed and 116 excluded; showing a net gain of 139. We also find 26 Sunday Schools reported with 1,271 members.

The news from all our foreign fields was never more encouraging. Africa, China, Japan, Brazil, Mexico, Italy and the isles of the sea are calling for more laborers. The harvest, indeed, is ripe and the laborers are few. "Pray ye the Lord of the harvest," that others may be sent to help our ever faithful and overworked missionaries already on the field. That this much neglected work receives attention we recommend that each church in this association set apart one Sunday in this year as foreign mission day and that a collection be takenfor our Foreign Board.

Although in ministeral education the Bible must ever remain preeminently the text book and the Holy Spirit the teacher, and we recognize the value of the service being rendered by pious and consecrated
servants of God who have not had the direct help of college or school,
present conditions make special mental training for the work of the
ministry desirable, if not actually indispensable. The Baptist colleges
and high schools of Arkansas are now of such excellency as to leave
largely without excuse young men who enter upon active work as ministers of the gospel without the training that will make them peers in
general education of those with whom they go in their work. We pledge
ourselves to use our abilities to assist in the support of the colleges
and schools now established at Arkadelphia, Conway, Mountain Home,
Star City and elsewhere in this state, and to help with our money
young men who, being called of God to the ministry, seek the needed
education at these institutions of learning.

JNO. X. SMITH, H. S. BROOKS, Committee.

This was spoken to by W. C. Harley and S. H. Woods

The committee appointed at the last sitting of this body looking to the establishing of a Baptist high school in our territory reported that they had bids from three points, namely: Ruby Station in Drew county, and Warren and Holly Springs in Bradley county, and that they would like to have positive instructions as to what course to pursue. After considerable discussion Bro. E. C. Faulkner resigned as a member of said committee and Bro. H. A. Munn and Jno. W. Creed added, and the committee instructed to go-forward and select location and erect suitable buildings without cost to this body, but that this body would stand by the committee in their work.

Our beloved brother, Jno. S. Wood, who was in the organization of this association fifty-one years ago, departed this life September 6, in his eightieth year. But we feel that he rests from his labors, and his works do follow him.

Bro. R. F. Hyatt, who was for a long time a prominent member of this body and treasurer of our Executive Board, also departed this life in December, 1900. We cherish his memory as a faithful and consistent brother.

#### CONSTITUTION.

- ARTICLE 1. The association shall be composed of members chosen by the different churches who, on presenting their credentials, shall be entitled to seats.
- ART. 2. This association shall be called Bartholomew Regular Baptist Association.
- ART. 3. Each church composing this association shall be entitled to three delegates.
- ART. 4. The object of this association shall be to devise measures to promote the Redeemer's kingdom, particularly in the bounds of this association.
- ART. 5. This association shall never possess any power or authority over any church, but may act as an advisory council.
- ART. 6. New churches may be admitted into this union by signifying their wish by letter and delegates, provided they are deemed orthodox.
- ART. 7. The officers of this association shall consist of a moderator, clerk and treasurer, and any member of the association shall be eligible to the offices aforesaid so long as the association shall call him—as amended.
- ART. 8. Every church shall be furnished with minutes, and every other benefit of the fund, in proportion to the money advanced.
- ART. 9. Amendments to the constitution may be made at any session of this association, when two-thirds of the members present shall deem it necessary.
- ART. 10. Any church becoming heterodox in faith or practice, after her reception, the association shall withdraw from said church; the word of God being the standard of orthodoxy—as amended.

#### ARTICLES OF FAITH.

- I. We believe in one true and living God, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit.
- II. We believe that the Scriptures composing the Old and New Testaments is the Word of God, and the only correct rule of faith and order.
- III. We believe in the doctrines of election as founded in the fore-knowledge of God through sanctification of the spirit unto obedience and sprinkling of the blood of Jesus Christ.
- IV. We believe that man was created upright, but by transgression fell from that state; consequently he and his posterity became dead in trepasses and sin.
- V. We believe in man's incapacity by his own free will and ability to recover himself from the fallen state in which he is by nature.
- VI. We believe that sinners are justified by the righteousness of Christ through faith in his name.

VII. We believe in the final perseverance of the saints in grace.

VIII. We believe in the final resurrection of the dead and the general judgment, and that the felicity of the righteous, and the punishment of the wicked will be eternal.

IX. We believe that no minister has any right to administer the ordinances of the Gospel but one who is regularly baptized, called and comes under the imposition of the hands of the presbytery.

X. We believe that baptism and the Lord's Supper are ordinances of the Church of Christ, and that believers are the only subjects, and that immersion only is baptism.

XI. We believe that the Lord's day should be observed as a day of rest and devotion.

#### RULES OF DECORUM.

- 1. This association shall be opened and closed with prayer.
- 2. A moderator and clerk shall be chosen by a majority of the members present.
- 3. It shall be the duty of the moderator to see that order is kept according to the Rules of Decorum.
- 4. Any member being dissatisfied with the decision of the moderator may appeal to the association, provided it be done on the same day.
- 5. One member only shall speak at a time, who shall address the moderator, and upon obtaining the floor, shall proceed, and not be interrupted while speaking, unless he departs from the subject or makes use of personal reflections.
- 6. No member shall be allowed to speak more than twice on any one subject without obtaining leave of the association.
- 7. No practice shall be allowed that is calculated to interrupt a member while speaking.
- 8. Every motion made and seconded; after time given for debate, shall be put to the association; unless previously withdrawn, and the moderator shall announce the decision to the association.
- 9. All questions shall be decided by a majority of the members present.
- 10. No appellation but that of brother shall be used by members in addressing each other while in session.
- 11. The moderator shall have same privilege of speech as other members, provided the chair is filled, but shall not be allowed to vote unless the association be equally divided.
- 12. The names of all members shall be called as often as the association may deem necessary, and no member shall withdraw himself from the association without leave of the association.
- 13. These rules shall be read at the opening of each session, and oftener if necessary.
