The nineteenth annual session of the Concord Assostion of Western Arkansas convened with Hopewell The Moderator, J. N. Pennington, present and pre-

ing. After singing and prayer, J. J. Holland preachthe Introductory sermon from 1st Cor., 3:11-15. He followed by J. W. Miller. Adjourned for refreshmts.

Re-assembled at 2 o'c. P. M. The Moderator read a 116th Psalm. W. B. Herndon offered prayer. J.J. Inland, James Edmondson, and W. B. Herndon were mpointed to read the letters from the churches.

The following churches presented petitionary letters and were received into this body :- Huntington, Cen-E Ridge, New Home, and Pleasant Grove No. 3. Bock Creek church, though its letter did not arrive, as represented by B. F. Haddock.

MONDAY, OCT. 21, 8:30 . M.
