MINUTES

OF THE

Saline Regular Baptist Association

OCTOBER, 1886.

FIRST DAY.

SATURDAY, October 2, 1886.

The introductory sermon was preached by Elder R. M. Thrasher, on Saturday, October 2, A. D. 1886, at 11 o'clock a.m., from 1 Cor. xv: 58, "Therefore, my beloved brethren, be ye steadfast, unmovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord, forasmuch as ye know that your labor is not in vain in the Lord."

The Association was called to order by the former Moderator, Elder W. A. Clark, D. D.

The Moderator appointed a Committee of ment. C. T. Glenn, A. Files, and the deacons and comment. Church.

The Association then took a recess till letters which Benediction by R. M. Thrasher.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

SATURDAY, October 2, 2:30 p.m.

The Association met promptly after the recess. The Moderator read the 90th Psalm, and led in prayer.

The letters from the churches were read and delegates' names enrolled. See table of statistics.

W. A. Clark, D. D., was elected Moderator for the ensuing year; R. M. Thrasher, Clerk, and Bro. C. T. Glenn, Treasurer.

On motion, agreed to appoint a Committee on State Missions also a Committee on Woman's Work.

Called for correspondents from sister Associations, where upon Caddo River Association responded by letter and messengers, to-wit: J. A. Chitwood, F. W. Mullins and Elder A. Nelson; and Red River Association: Elder Hawes H. Coleman; Pine Bluff Association: Frank White, D. D.

Elder M. D. Early, Evangelist and Financial Secretary of the Arkansas Baptist Convention, was invited to a seat in the Association; also Elder Isom P. Langley of the Second Baptist Church of Little Rock.

The Moderator bade the messengers and brethren welcome and extended the right hand of fellowship.

Called for petitionary letters, whereupon Friendship Church, Hot Spring county, applied for membership in this Association by letter and delegates.

After examination, being found regularly organized and the faith of the gospel, the said church was adship, and the Moderator gave the right hand e delegates whose names were enrolled. See

fator announced the arrangements for preaching d, for the various churches to-morrow, the Lord's ort on preaching.

On Prayer Meetings: Elder D. K. McVay, Geo. W. Smith Hansford Deer.

On Religious Literature: Elder J. C. Henderson, Elder E. W. Gentry, Elder B. M. Phillips.

On Finance: Wm. Fowler, B. C. Fitzhugh, John C. Ross. On Documents: Elder J. J. Adams, W. H. Rigsby, J. B. Nance.

On Home Missions: Elder J. L. Hales, Elder B. N. Hultsman, Elder J. J. Greer.

On State Missions: J. T. Jelks, M. D., Elder M. D. Early, Z. T. McVay.

On Woman's Work: I. A. Epps, Elder Frank White, J. M. Crawford,

The Association then adjourned to 8 o'clock a.m., Monday, October 4, 1886.

SECOND DAY.

Monday, October 4, 8 a.m.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment.

Prayer by Elder E. W. Gentry.

Renewed the call for letters from churches, whereupon Mt. Pleasant and Cedar Glades churches presented letters which were read and delegates enrolled. See table.

The minutes of Saturday were read and approved.

Called the roll of churches and marked absentees * See table.

Called for reports of Committees. The following reports were submitted, to-wit:

- I. On Religious Literature: Read, and after remarks by Early, Thrasher and Clark, was adopted without opposition. See "A."
- .2. On Foreign Missions: The report was read, and after speeches by Brethren Langley, White and Early, was adopted, and a cash collection was taken, amounting to \$13.40, for Foreign Missions. See "B."
- 3. On Sunday-schools: The report was read, and after discussion by Bros. White, Clark, Hultsman and Z. T. McVay, on motion of J. J. Greer it was amended, by striking out the recommendation to employ a Sunday-school missionary, and then adopted. See "C."
- 4. On Prayer Meetings: Read, and after interesting talks by Brethren White, Early and others, the report was adopted See "D."
- 5. On Ministerial Education: The report was read and speeches were made by Clark, Langley and Early. Pending the discussion the Association adjourned to 1:30 o'clock p.m, Bro. Early having the floor.

Benediction by Elder J. J. Greer.

ATTERNOON SESSION.

Monday, October 4, 1:30 p.m.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment.

The Moderator being absent, on motion, Elder J. J. Greer was called to the chair.

Bro. Early resumed his speech on the report on Ministerial Education.

Bros. White, Clark and Thrasher participated in the discussion. The report was adopted. See "E."

Dr. Clark resumed the chair.

The Association received the following telegram from Bro. J. W. Conger, President of Ouachita College, at Arkadelphia, Clark county, Arkansas:

"The State Baptist College sends greetings to Saline Association. May the cause of our blessed Master be enhanced; and may Christian education receive your hearty support. We have enrolled one hundred and fifty-five pupils; forty-six boarders. Sorry we cannot be with you."

On motion of Bro. Thrasher, the following answer was returned:

"By the grace of God, we'll stand by you."

- 6. On State Missions: The report was read, and after an interesting speech by Bro. Early, urging co-operation with the State Convention in this work, it was adopted. See "F."
 - 7. On Documents: Read and adopted. See "G."
- 8. On Finance: Read and adopted, with the understanding that the Clerk place in the statistics the contributions mentioned in the letter from Ebenezer church. See "H."
- 9. On Home Missions: Read, and amended the report, referring that part relative to the appointment of a missionary to the Executive Board. It was then adopted. See "I."
- 10. The report of the Executive Board was submitted, and after raising by cash contributions from the brethren present \$30.55, the amount necessary to pay our missionary for services rendered, the report was adopted. See "J."

On motion, the Clerk was instructed to drop from our minutes the names of all ministers who are not reported in the letters from the churches, unless the delegates give the names

of ministers belonging to their respective churches, or the clerk knows them to be in good standing.

A petition from Saline church was presented by Bro. W. R. H. Mills in regard to the election of Pastor. It was decided that the Association has no jurisdiction in the matter.

The Association then adjourned to 7 o'clock p.m.

EVENING SESSION.

Monday, October 4, 7 p.m.

The Association met pursuant to adjournment.

Prayer by Bro. J. B. Wood.

On motion, took under consideration the question of appointing Elder B. N. Hultsman missionary for the ensuing year. The vote was taken by churches and Elder Hultsman was elected missionary for the ensuing year, at fifty dollars per month, and pledges were made for his support amounting to three hundred dollars. See list "K."

The following brethren were appointed an Executive Board:

W. A. Clark, D. D., C. T. Glenn, J. L. Hales, J. B. Wood, and J. T. Jelks, M. D.

11. The Treasurer made his report which was adopted See "L."

12. The report of Committee on Woman's Work was read and adopted. See "M."

The Association ordered the Clerk to have 1000 minutes printed, and to distribute the same among the churches, and that he receive \$20 for his services.

Adopted the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we tender our thanks to the Baptists and friends of Hot Springs for their courtesies in entertaining us during this session.

Resolved, That the thanks of this Association be tendered Col. J. N. Conger, Superintendent of the Hot Springs Railroad, for his liberality in returning delegates over his excellent road to Malvern free of charge.

Resolved, That the thanks of this body be given to the Moderator for the able and courteous manner in which he has presided over its sessions; also to the Clerk for the faithful record of business done.

The minutes were then read and approved.

After singing and taking the parting hand, the Moderator led in prayer, and the Association then adjourned to meet with Smith Creek Church, on Saturday before the first Sunday in October, at 11 o'clock a.m., 1887.

SEMI-CENTENNIAL MEETING.

Fifty years ago the Saline Regular Baptist Association was organized at the residence of Bro. David Dodd in Saline county, Arkansas, on Saturday before the first Lord's day in October, A. D. 1836.

During the present meeting interesting talks were made by Elders John C. Henderson, M. D. Early, H. H. Coleman, R.

M. Thrasher and W. A. Clark, giving reminiscences, practical thoughts and suggestions; concerning the work of the Association during the past fifty years.

This Association, composed of five little churches in 1836, with a total of seventy-eight members, has made wonderful progress. Eight or ten Associations and about 15,000 members now occupy the territory once occupied by this Association. This Association now has 52 churches and over 2000 members.

APPENDIX.

A.

RELIGIOUS LITERATURE.

Your Committee on Religious Literature offer the following as their report:

We know that there are many religions in the world. Some are false and should be entirely discarded—should be shunned as we would shun deadly poison. Some are more or less false, and others are more or less true. But there is but one true religion, one true faith, and that is contained in the Bible. The Bible, then, above all other books, demands our most careful and diligent study.

While the simple story of the Cross, heard and believed, saves the sinner from eternal death, there is a system of faith, or doctrine, revealed in the Bible which all of the Lord's people should observe. The misconstruction or perversion of the Holy Scriptures has caused much confusion and strife among those who claim to love the Lord Jesus Christ.

Jesus says: "If a man loves Me, he will keep My words." It is the desire and purpose of every true Christian to obey

the Master. But, Paul says: "Now, I beseech you, brethren, mark them which cause divisions and offenses, contrary to the doctrine which ye have learned, and avoid them. For they that are such serve not our Lord Jesus Christ, but their own belly; and by good words and fair speeches deceive the simple." Romans xvi, 17, 18. And there is no doubt that many good people have, in many particulars, been led away from the truth. It behooves the disciples of Christ to search continually for the old paths—the true paths of obedience—and walk therein.

The Bible first, the Bible last, the Bible all the time, should be the motto of every one who loves the Lord Jesus Christ in sincerity and truth. It should be our daily companion.

There are many helps to Bible study which cannot be discarded without loss of much valuable time. Every Bible student should have a Concordance and a Bible Dictionary. Without these, Bible study will be difficult, and the progress slow.

There are many books and papers published on various religious subjects and questions of doctrine. Of these we should be cautious in the selection, taking those only which reflect the truth.

We recommend to our brethren the publications of the American Baptist Publication Society, and especially the Sunday-school helps. Send to Lewis E. Kline, 1109 Olive Street, St. Louis, Mo.

We also recommend that our brethren take the Arkansas Baptist, published at Little Rock by Bro. W. A. Forbes, \$2 per annum. This paper is the medium of communication for Arkansas Baptists, and no one who wishes to be posted in regard to our work in Arkansas can afford to do without it.

MINISTERIAL EDUCATION.

Your Committee on Ministerial Education offer the following report:

The minister of the Gospel of the grace of God-the Gospel of Jesus Christ-occupies a position more solemnly interesting and more intensely responsible than any vocation or profession known among men. In fact, it is the embodiment of all noble, praiseworthy and useful vocations. He must be familiar with the shepherd, watching over his flocks and leading them forth to pasturage and watering, as David, the shepherd king. He must stand meditatively beside the herdsman taking the oversight of his cattle, as Jacob, Laban's herdsman or as Moses, Jethro's "cow-boy" and Israel's law-giver. He must go with the florist into the fields and gather roses of Sharon, or lilies of the field. He must be sailor, study the art of navigation and the mysteries of the seas; stand by the Savior as He says to the troubled waves, "peace, be still;" or kneel with Paul amidst the hurricane's sweep and ocean's roar. and hear the timbers crash when the vessel strikes Melita: or sleep, like Jonah, and awake to a sense of his danger, only to be cast overboard and go down into the depths of the sea. He must labor with the husbandman as he sows the seed, reaps the golden harvest, threshes it, drives the chaff away, and gathers the grain in his garner.

A fisherman, he must mend his nets, man his boat, and cast the net into the sea and haul ashore the fishes, and gather the good into vessels, and cast the bad away. Laboring in the vineyard, he must dress the vines, gather the grapes for the vintage, and tread the wine-press—though not alone. As a scientist he must fathom the depths of ocean, tell earth's formation, scan the starry-decked heavens, and tell of Orion and Pleiades. Anatomist, poet, rhetorician, mathematician, linguist, lawyer, physician, moulder, engraver, blacksmith, silversmith, merchant, jeweler, miner—of all these must he have knowledge. History, kingdoms, countries, peoples, government, ethics, domestic and political economy, music, art, pantomime, visions, dreams—all these, and more than these, are to be found in that wonderful book, the Bible. And the minister of this Word is commanded to "study to show himself approved unto God, a

workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the Word of Truth."

As a soldier he must learn to command and obey, taking upon him the whole armor of God, having his feet shod with the preparation of the Gospel of Peace, his loins girt about with Truth, putting on the breastplate of righteousness and the helmet of salvation, taking the shield of faith and the sword of the Spirit which is the Word of God, he must march forth to the conflict with principalities and powers, and spiritual wickedness in high places, heeding the commands of the Great Captain of Salvation. He must endure hardness as a good soldier of Christ, with the assurance that the contest is not doubtful, that he shall be partaker of the triumph and glory which are to follow upon the sufferings of Christ.

As an ambassador for Christ, he must go forth with the word of reconciliation, bearing the message of pardon and peace to lost souls in rebellion against Heaven's King. Knowing the terror of the Lord, at His coming, to evil doers, he must plead with them earnestly and pursuade them to flee the wrath to come.

Ah! well may he ask with the Apostle Paul: "Who is sufficient for these things?" The novice, vainly imagining that no preparation is necessary for this stupendous work, strikes out boldly, but blindly, and soon falls into the snare and condemnation of the devil. But he who is called of God to this important work and realizes the magnitude of its responsibility, must and will spend days and nights, months and years, in prayer, in meditation, in patient study of the Word of God, with all the helps at his command, to acquaint himself with the varied and arduous duties of this office.

He needs all the heart training and the mind training, requiring the work of a lifetime, possible to obtain, to make him eminently successful in ministerial work.

As long as the minister preaches, he must study. To enter upon this life-work, he should, if possible, obtain, before com-

mencing, at least a common school education. With the aid afforded by the State there is no excuse for any of our young brethren growing up without this.

Again, our denomination has good High Schools and Colleges, giving young ministers tuition free. Among them is the Ouachita College, located at Arkadelphia, Clark County, Arkansas. We recommend all of our young ministers to avail themselves of the opportunity of improving their education. But if any of our young brethren find it impossible, or impracticable, to go to school, they must study at home, obtaining such help, from time to time, as they may be able to secure.

Whether he can go to school or not, the minister should understand that "the education of every man must be chiefly his own work." Let him, therefore, under the direction of some brother of experience, mark out for himself a course of study and pursue it diligently and faithfully, and thus he may educate himself for his high vocation.

REPORT OF MISSIONARY TO EXECUTIVE BOARD.

BRETHREN:—I entered upon the work assigned me June 1st, 1886. While I have labored to do what I could for Jesus in our bounds, I have greatly failed to meet the wants of need of being taught practical godliness. Many of them are without Sunday-schools, prayer meetings, and some without Pastors.

I have traveled 360 miles, preached 135 sermons, organized 2 Sunday-schools, organized 6 Prayer Meetings, baptized 88 believers, 25 have been restored to fellowship, 27 received by letter, and there have been 125 conversions connected with my work. I have labored four (4) months, and have collected on the field \$55.00; received from Treasurer, \$112.90; balance due me, \$30.55.
