ELD. JOHN WILLIAM WEST.

Born in Indiana Feb. 5, 1841. Died in Benton County, Ark., July 27, 1917. Was converted and united with the Baptist Church when I years of age. Ordained to the ministry by the Liberty Church, Newton County, Mo., April 12, 1874. Was a messenger in the first annual session of the Benton County Baptist Association at Corner Springs Church in 1884. Preached the introductory sermon in this Association in the sessions of 1889, 1897, 1901, 1906, 1912, and 1914. Moderator of the Association in 1907, 1908, 1912, 1913, 1914, and 1915. Missionary of the Association in 1887, 1888, 1889, 1893, 1894, 1896, 1904, and 1905.

Proceedings

FRIDAY MORNING, SEPTEMBER 7, 1917

The Benton County Baptist Association met, according to previous adjournment, with the Baptist Church at Lowell on Friday before the second Sunday in September, 1917. Singing by the congregation. Reading of First Psalm and prayer by Eld. W, C. Hamby. Singing, "In the Sweet Bye and Bye." Singing, "Crown Him Lord of All."

Eld. J. A. Smith and E. C. Conley were appointed as reading c'erks, and the letters were read and messengers enrolled.

The 11 o'clock hour having arrived, a motion prevailed to suspend reading and proceed with the introductory sermon. Song, "Jesus Paid It All." Eld. L. L. Johnson, who was selected at the last session of this body to preach this sermon, then took the service, and after reading lesson from the 17th chapter of John and prayer led by Eld. T. F. Jones, preached the introductory sermon from 2 Peter 2:1, on "Denying the Lord."

Motion prevailed to adjourn to 1:30 p. m. Prayer by E. M. Bagby.

FRIDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Song, "Work, For the Night Is Coming!" Reading of 2 Tim. 4th chapter and prayer by Eld. J. A. Smith. Resuming business, other letters were read and roll was called.

Motion provailed to go into the election of Moderator and Clerk. Eld. A. N. Sanders and N. O. West were appointed tellers to distribute and gather ballots, which were counted by the reading clerks. Eld. T. F. Jones was elected Moderator and Eld. J. L. Chastain, Clerk.

Committee on Divine Service was appointed, consisting of the messengers of Lowell Church, with E. C. Brooks of Maysville Church and R. Edwards of Mt. Pleasant.

Petitionary letters were called for, and response was made by the church at Falling Springs. The letter not having the form of retition, on motion the messenger present from that church was a ked to state whether the church voted to unite with this Association. He answering in the affirmative, on motion the church was received and messengers enrolled.

Also potitionary letter from the Liberty Church worshiping at Minnehaha Schoolhouse in Oklahoma was presented. On motion the church was received on the letter. The Moderator then extended the hand of fellowship to the messengers of these churches.

On motion took up the question of the place of next meeting and the preacher of the introductory sermon, resulting in the choice

of Springtown as the place and T. F. Jones to preach the sermon, with A. N. Sanders as alternate.

Eld. W. S. Crowley, missionary, submitted report of his work. Report was discussed by Eld. G. W. Setser, E. C. Brooks, Eld. A. N. Sanders, Eld. L. L. Johnson, Eld. G. C. Harris, Eld. W. S. Crowley, A. R. Hall, T. D. Puttishall, E. F. Rice and others, and was adopted.

An invitation to visiting brethren and sisters was responded to by Eld. W. B. Collins of Crooked Creek Association; Eld. J. A. Smith, editor of The Baptist and Commoner; Eld. J. N. B. Høpler, Eld. W. A. Moffitt, Eld. H. W. Miller, Eld. W. C. Hamby, Elder P. A. Grawe, E. C. Conley, Eld. E. F. Rice of Fayetteville Association, H. I. Gorum and wife of Bentonville.

Motion prevailed to adjourn till 8 p. m. Prayer by E. C. Brooks.

FRIDAY EVENING SESSION

Singing and prayer. Sermon by Eld. J. A. Smith from Matt. 4:1 on The Temptation of Jesus. Prayer by Eld. G. W. Setser.

List of Committees appointed was read by the Moderator.

Motion prevailed to adjourn till 8 a. m. tomorrow. Benediction by Eld. J. L. Chastain.

SATURDAY MORNING SESSION

Singing. Reading of Psa. 42 by the Moderator and prayer by Eld. E. F. Rice. Song.

Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

Invitation to visitors again extended. Was responded to by Eld. W. S. Luper of Fayetteville Association, Dan M. Setser of Tulsa, Okla.

Motion prevailed that Falling Springs Church, on their invitation, be made the place of next Fifth Sunday Meeting, the pastor and ordained help of that church to prepare program.

The Committee on State Missions submitted report, which was uiscussed by Eld. A. N. Sanders and Eld. J. A. Smith. A collection of \$27.00 was taken for State Missions. Further discussion by E. M. Bagby, Eld. T. F. Jones, and the report was adopted.

The Committee on Obituaries submitted report, which was discussed by J. L. Chastain, G. W. Setser, G. W. Birkes, T. F. Jones, E. M. Bagby, C. C. Standlee, W. B. Collins, E. C. Brooks, E. F. Rice, Dan M. Setser, A. N. Sanders, W. S. Crowley, and the report was adopted.

Motion prevailed that the Clerk be authorized to devote as much space in our minutes as is necessary to the memory of Eld. J. W. West, whose name occurs in the report on Obstuaries, and in-

sert his photograph, with such memorial as he may draft.

A voluntary offering of \$2.20 was received to apply toward paying the expenses of the same.

The Committee on Temporance submitted report, which was discussed by E. M. Bagby, W. C. Hamby, E. F. Rice, E. C. Brooks, II. W. Miller, and the report was adopted.

Motion prevailed that Associational Missions be given right of way from the beginning of the afternoon session until all connected with it has been disposed of.

The Committee on Ministerial Education and Support submitted report, which was discussed by Eld. I. I. Johnson, after which a motion prevailed that this report be laid over till after the matter of Associational Missions is disposed of for further discussion and action.

Song, "Keep Praying As You Go." Preaching by Eld. W. S. Crowley, from Psa. 126:3-5.

Motion provailed to take recess till 1:30 p. m. Song. Prayer by Roy Daugherty.

SATURDAY AFTERNOON SESSION

Song. Reading of Psa. 23 and prayer by Eld. G. W. Birkes. Song, "The Rock That is Higher Than I."

The hour having arrived for this matter, the Committee on Associational Missions submitted report, which was discussed by E. C. Brooks, W. A. Martin, G. W. Setser, A. N. Sanders, E. F. Rice, and the report was amended and adopted.

Motion prevailed to elect missionary and executive committee of three at same time by tellers. Eld. J. A. Smith and J. N. Hamby were appointed as tellers, and the vote resulted in the choice of W. S. Crowley as missionary and Eld. T. F. Jones, E. C. Brooks and Eld. J. L. Chastain as Executive Committee.

Motion prevailed that the missionary be allowed \$50.00 per month straight time for his work.

Taking up the report on Ministerial Education and Support, so me was adopted. A collection was taken in pledges to help Bro. Roy E. Daugherty in Jacksonville College as a ministerial student.

Committee on Foreign Missions submitted report, which was adopted.

Letter from Southern Grove Church was read. On statement of messengers that the church intended to become associated with this body, and further statements from Eid. H. W. Miller, who is pastor of that church, and others acquainted with some of the facts, a motion prevailed that the church be received and messengers enrolled. The Moderator then extended the hand of fellowship to

the messengers of that church, Sisters Butler and Allstot, in behalf of the Association.

A motion prevailed to adjourn to 8 p. m.

SATURDAY EVENING SESSION Preaching by Eld. W. C. Hamby from 1 Tim. 4:16. Motion prevailed to adjourn to 8 a.m. tomorrow.

SUNDAY MORNING SESSION

Song, "Yield Not to Temptation." Reading of Titus 2nd chap. and prayer by W. G. Jones.

Minutes of yesterday's proceedings were read and approved.

Motion prevailed that, through the remainder of this session, specches on reports be limited, opening speeches to five minutes and others to three.

The Committee on Finance submitted report, which was adopted.

The Treasurer aubmitted partial report, which was adopted with amendments to be added by the Treasurer.

A motion prevailed that the churches be requested to take collections for minutes to augment the fund on hand and send same to the Clerk.

The Committee on Sunday Schools submitted report from last year's minutes and recommended its reindorsement. On motion report was adopted after discussion by Lee Reed, W. S. Crowley, W. C. Hamby, Dan M. Setser, J. A. Smith, E. C. Brooks and James H. Jones.

The Committee on Publications submitted report, which was discussed by Roy E. Daugherty, John Setser, A. N. Sanders, W. C. Hamby, E. C. Brooks, G. W. Setser, Dan M. Setser, J. A. Smith, J. L. Chastsin, W. S. Crowley, and the report was adopted.

The Committee on Orphans' Home submitted report, which was discussed by Roy E. Daugherty, J. A. Smith, W. S. Crowley, T. F. Jones, A. N. Sanders, and report was adopted

Resolution of thanks was presented and adopted.

Minutes of today's proceedings were read and approved.

Motion prevailed that a collection be taken for Texarkana Orrhans' Home immediately after the sermon today.

Motion prevailed to take recess till 10:45.

After recess, about fifteen minutes was spent in song service, after which sermon was preached by Eld. J. A. Smith on The Origin and Perpetuity of the Church, from Matt. 15:18.

Collection taken for Texarkana Orphans' Home amounting to \$42.60.

Motion prevailed to adjourn to time and place of next meeting. Singing and handshake. Prayer by Dan M. Setser.

Report of mission work done from Feb. 25, 1917, to Sept. 7, 1917: Sermons preached, 212; professions of conversion, 75; batisms 28; additions to churches by letter, 25; by statement, 16; total additions, 69; homes visited, 262; prayers in homes, 176; churches visited, 18; Sunday Schools visited, 15; churches organized, 1; Sunday Schools organized, 1; preachers ordained, 1; funerals conducted, 1; timp worked, 6 months, 12 days; received on the field, \$-14.62; of treasurer, \$142.80; balance of treasurer, \$61.58; total, \$319.00.

STATE MISSIONS

We your Committee on State Missions submit the following:

State Missions means missions in the State of Arkansas. There is much destitution in our State. It is our duty as Baptists to give the gospel of Christ to all the people in our State. Some effort is being made by the churches composing the State Association of Baptist Churches of Arkansas to evangelize the State. The State Association had three missionaries last year. They reported days labored, 297; sermons preached, 319; additions to churches, 129. We collected for State Missions, \$1.652.32.

The State Association has five missionaries on the field this year, and they are doing good work. We need more men on the field and more means to support them.

We recommend that the churches of this Association co-operate with other churches in the State in carrying on this work in the State.

CONSTITUTION

Article I. This Association shall be composed of messengers who shall be members of the churches they represent (except such as may be 'nvited to a seat by consent of the body) and shall be styled "The Benton County Baptist Association."

Art. II. This Association shall meet annually on Friday before the second Sunday in September, at the place previously appointed; and after public worship and reading of letters from the churches, a Moderator and Clerk shall be chosen from the messengers by ballot, both of whom shall hold their offices until others shall be elected.

Art. III. It shall be the duty of the Clerk to make an accurate record of the proceedings of each meeting of the Association, in a took provided for the purpose. He shall also act as Treasurer.

Art. IV. Each church may send three messengers. The messengers shall present letters certifying their appointment, and briefly expressing the state of the churches, their increase and decrease, and their aggregate number. Each church shall send with the letter money for printing the minutes, out of which fund the Clerk shall be allowed ten dollars for his services in preparing manuscripts and supervising the printing and distribution of the minutes.

Art. V. Churches wishing to unite with the Association may apply by letters and messengers, and giving satisfactory information of their being sound in doctrine and correct in practice, they may be received by unanimous vote, in token of which the Moderator shall give to the messengers the right hand of fellowship in behalf of the Association. Churches may be dismissed upon application.

Art. VI. We acknowledge the independence of the particular churches, and that no authority or jurisdiction is to be exercised over them by this Association, nor will the Association decide in any controversy that may arise in any church. Nevertheless they deem it theireduty to disown any church belonging to this body which may have essentially departed from the faith.

Art. VII. When a church shall neglect making any communication to the Association for three years successfully, it shall be considered as having withdrawn from us, and shall be dropped from the minutes of the Association, unless at least two members request their continuance , who shall engage to enquire into their standing, and report at the next meeting of the Association.

Art. VIII. This Association shall have the right to open and hold correspondence with other Associations, as may be deemed expedient.

Art. IX. It shall be the duty of the Association, from time to time, to suggest to the several churches such measures as may be wise and proper to promote the interest of the Master's kingdom, and spread the gospel throughout the world.

Art. X. This Constitution may be amended at any regular n.eeting of the Association, by a two-thirds vote of all the members present.
