FORTY-SIXTH ANNUAL SESSION
OF THE
FAYETTEVILLE BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

The Association met with Springdale Church Friday, September 1, 1916. After reading 121 Psalm by L. L. Johnson and prayer by O. L. Lierly, the moderator being absent, the body was called to order by the clerk, and W. C. Hamby was chosen moderator pro tem.

The time came for the Introductory sermon, and C. S. Farmer preached it from Luke 20:17. Motion that we stand adjourned to 2. p. m. Dismissed in prayer by H. W. Miller.

2 p. m. House called to order by the moderator; devotional services conducted by O. L. Lierly, by reading Titus 2d; and prayer by F. A. Graue. The reading of letters was resumed.

Motion carried that we go into permanent organization.

W. C. Hamby, E. C. Oonley, E. S. Thompson and A. M. Reed were placed in nomination for moderator; then motion that nominations close. The vote was taken, and W. C. Hamby was declared elected moderator. The moderator appointed the committee on Divine service: the messengers of Sprindale Church and F. A. Graue were named. Motion that we make the election of W. C. Hamby unanimous was carried.

Motion prevailed that we elect O. S. Farmer clerk by acclamation. The rules of order were read by the Chair. The moderator appointed E. C. Oonley and A. M. Reed the Committee on Finance. The letter from Valley Grove church was read and messenger's names, Mr. and Mrs. D. L. Hood, enrolled.

Called for petitionary letters and none found. Called for visiting ministers; and L. L. Johnson of Beuten Co. and E. J. McKinney of Little Rock, reported.

The Committee on Divine services made their report: that E. J. McKinney would preach to night, J. F. Parker Saturday at 11 a. m., L. L. Johnson at 8 p. m. Saturday. Dismissed with prayer by J. F. Parker.

8 p. m.—Called to order by the moderator. Had preaching by E. J. McKinney from Luke 23: 39-43 and Eph. 2: 8-10.

Bro. J. G. Lile of Ouachita College gave us talk in the interest of the school. Motion that we make the first thing after noon Saturday, on Temperance. Motion that we adjourn to 9 a. m.

Dismissed with prayer by O. L. Lierly,

Saturday September 2nd.

9 a. m.—House called to order by moderator. Devotional Services by J. F. Parker by reading the 24 Psalm, and prayer.

The Committee on Foreign Missions made their report. The Committee on Home Missions made their report; and motion to discuss the two together, carried. And after discussion both were adopted.

The Committee on Romanism made their report, which was adopted after the discussion. At 11 a. m. J. F. Parker preached from 1 Peter 2: 13. Motion that after Temperance report, we have the report of the Missionary and the Executive Board. Motion that we stand adjourned to 1: 45 p. m.

Dismissed with prayer by D. L. Hood.

1: 45 p. m.—House called to order by the moderator Devotional services and prayer led by D. L. Hood. Committee on Temperance made their report. We had with us S. C. Parish of the Anti-Saloon League of Arkansas. Motion that we hear Bro. Parish. After discussion the report was adopted.

The Missionary made his report. The Executive Board made their report. The Committee on Associational Missions made their report; and after discussion, the report on Associational Missions was amended by striking out the "recomending of the selection of the Missionary to the Executive Board" and leave it to the Association. All three reports were adopted.

Motion that we go into the election of a Missionary. Nominations were called for, and Bros. L. L. Johnson and O. L. Lierly were placed in nomination; the vote taken and L. L. Johnson was declared elected. Motion that we make it unanimous carried. The Committee on Ministerial Education made their report, and the report was adopted.

The Committee on Nominations made their report, and it was adopted. We then went into the selection of the next place of the meeting of the Association. Oakland and Fayetteville were put in nomination, the vote was taken and Fayetteville was declared to be selected for next meeting place of the Association.

Motion carried empowering the Executive Committee to make such arrangements with the newly elected Missionary, Bro. L. L. Johnson, as is necessary; and in case he cannot accept, make full arrangements for a Missionary.

Motion prevailed to adjourn until 8 p. m. Dismissed in prayer by A. G. Flowers. At 8 p. m. met and had sermon by L. L. Johnson on the author and finisher of our faith, Heb. 12: 2.

The Committee on Divine Services reported that W. A. Moffitt would preach here 11 a. m. Sunday; D. L. Hood, at M. E. South's House at 11 a. m.; and H. W. Miller, at Oakland at p. m.

The Committee on Finance read their report and it was adopted. Motion that we authorize the clerk to appropriate sufficient amount of cash to make up the deficit in the minute fund. The motion was amended so as to give the Ladies one page in the minutes. The Treasurer made his report and it was adopted.

The Committee on Ministerial Support made their report; and it was approved. Motion that we adjourn to meet at 9 o'clock Sunday morning. Dismissed with prayer by W. A. George.

Sunday September 3rd.

9 a. m.—Devotional services led by Bro. H. W. Miller by reading James 2: 14 and prayer. Committee on State Missions rendered their report; and after discussion it was adopted. Motion that we limit speeches to five minutes was approved.

The Committee on Sunday Schools made their report and after discussion was adopted. The Committee on Obituary made their report and was adopted.

Motion that we take pledges for Associational Missions. Moved that the chair appoint the clerk with two other brethren to arrange for a Fifth Sunday Meeting.

Motion that the minutes be adopted as recorded by the clerk. Motion approved that we stand adjourned to the time and the place of next meeting.

Contributions last year \$518,323; baptisms 6,471; churches organized 77; missionaries 315; native workers 651; membership 42,632; churches 459; self supporting 95; Sunday schools 462; mission schools 453; students 13,531; training schools for women 6; theological schools 18; medical missionaries 19; hospitals 9; patients treated last year 74,866. Report on Temperance

We your committee on temperance beg leave to report: The subject of this report means prohibition of the liquor traffic in strong drink. Sin is abroad in the land, and of all the channels through which sin operates there is none greater known today to the human race. It is at once a destroyer of both soul and body, and the blight of human lives, the curse of the home and society, and the greatest of crime breeder in the state and nation. Our courts show at least 75 per cent of the offences committed, liquor is the prime cause. It defies the laws of the land, and sneers at the laws of God; and tramples a bruised race under its feet, and dares to blaspheme the sacred name of our blessed Redeemer. Its venomous fangs are being buried in the bleeding hearts of the human race. It feeds upon the blood of innocent victims as long as it has life; and then casts the wreckage of a ruined life into the grave. Its haughty head is lifted into the most holy place, and demands honorable recognition. We note with pride, the marvelous progress we have made in the nation, and more especially in our own great state, of the complete removal of the liquor traffic. Our prayer to God is that we go on until we completely wipe it off the face of our fair land. We commend the faithful work of our law making body, in securing the passage of our present State Wide prohibition law. We note with alarm, the efforts that is at present, being put forth by the liquor forces, to have this law, that we labored so long to secure, repealed and placed in its stead, a "Local Option Law", and it will be on our ballots at the coming election in November, as Act No. 2. We, as a body, hereby pledge our every support in upholding the present prohibition law; and that we as Baptists see to it that the men we support for the legislature stand four square against the nefarious liquor traffic in any form.
