MONDAY MORNING SESSION, OCTOBER 23, 1905.

The committee on Sunday Schools submits their report as follows:

We believe that the Sunday school is the medium for the systematic teaching of God's word. Would recommend that every church in this association organize l. We would recommend that care be taken in selecting teachers a Sunday school. and superintendents, and that only consecrated christians be chosen for important positions. We are sorry to note from letters that various churches in the association are without Sunday schools. Let the children in particular be carefully trained, for the future hope of the church depends upon them.

Believing as we do that a call to the ministry is the highest honor ever bestowed on man, and in order that he may be thoroughly furnished to every good work and fully equipped to accomplish the design for which he was called, that of preching the gospel for the edification of the people and faithful warning of sinners, as ambassadors for Christ, it is very necessary that he be free from secular or manual labor, that he may give his entire time to this calling. Therefore we recommend that as pastor he fail not to declare the whole counsel of God and instruct the churches in their duty, impressing them with the fact that it is ordained that they that preach the gospel shall live of the gospel,

The committee on evils of intemperance submit their report as follows:

Intemperance, as generally accepted and understood, is the indulgence in the use of intoxicating liquors, and is the foundation of more evil than any other one thing that can be mentioned. Take the records of our courts, and four-fifths of all crimes are traceable to intemperance. It breeds murderers, gamblers, liars, thieves and every other class of criminals. It breaks up the peace of home and

communities; it breaks the hearts of loving wives, mothers and sisters; it disqualities for business or society; it fills our prisons, ruins health and drags down to hell the souls of men. These and many other evils that might be mentioned being true, we recommend and urge that all christians, and especially our Baptist brethern, stand shoulder to shoulder together against this great evil by voting against license and teaching our boys, by example as well as by precept, to touch not, taste not and handle not this unclean and dangerous thing, and that our churches be urged to discipline all members who may indulge in its use.

Committee on Orphans Home submitted the following report:

The Baptist Orphanage Home is located at Monticello, Ark. Mrs. Hannah Hyatt Cardner is the faithful and sacrificing matron. There are 66 at present in the home, and being much crowded, additional buildings are nesessary. Owing to the ill health of Rev. W. W. Gardner, the flaancial agent, we have had no active agent in the field the greater part of this year, and the funds are exhausted. Hence, we recommend that the churches of this association make liberal contributions for the support and welfare of these helpless and dependent orphans.

J. Willingham, corresponding secretary to board, or through any other channel they may see fit. We further recommend that a collection be taken now for foreign missions.

According to the instruction of the association at last session we have employed a missionary to fill the destitution employing Bro. J. M. Copeland for full time at fifty [\$50] dollars per month. Our missionary has put in 118 days for which we have paid him \$195.60; received from all sources \$17.45; by order from Bro. Neal \$40; paid out for different purposes \$216.40; balance on hand \$1.65; balance in the treasury \$96.82. We have done colportage work through our missionary which has proven a great factor in the work. Sermons preached 73, prayer service 47, visits 19, received by harding 9, received by latter and statement 19, built two, abunch to, received by baptism 9, received by letter and statement 19; built two church houses and organized 1 Sunday school. The board thinks there has been great good done under adverse circumstances—rain and high water.

Inasmuch as the word of God abounds with prescious promises of abundant blessings to those who come to Him in earnest, faithful prayer, we feel that every church as a church should avail itself of this great God-given opportunity to advance the cause of Christ and the honor of God's name, for we are convinced that no church of Christ can ever hope to attain to its full mission of usefulness in the Master's vineyard without a well attended, spiritual, weekly prayermeeting.
