

# PROCEEDINGS.

The United Association met at Cedar Creek Church on Friday, September 9th, 1887; Moderator and Clerk present. The introductory sermon was preached by M. K. Broadaway.

On motion, E. A. Wolverton and G. W. Ford were appointed to read the letters from the churches.

On motion, suspended the order of business and called for petitionary letters; came forward. Bethlehem, Springfield, Mount Gilead and Lone Oak Churches, and through their messengers, asked to be received as members of this Body.

On motion, the above named churches were received and the hand of fellowship was extended to the messengers.

On motion, proceeded to permanent organization by election of officers, which resulted in the choice of J. K. Broadaway for Moderator, E. A. Wolverton, Clerk; and J. J. Stanton, Treasurer.

On motion, W. L. Wolverton, H. C. Emmerson and Daniel Norwood were appointed a committe on devotional exercises. On order of business the following were cappointed: B. H. Bearden, W. L. Wolverton, J. M. W. Massingale.

On motion, adjourned for dinner to meet at 4 o'clock, P. M. Prayer by Bro. Brundridge.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met at 4 o'clock P. M. Prayer by Elder D. F. Knight.

On motion, the Moderator proceeded to the appointment of committees as follows:

Ministerial Education—B. M. Stephens, J. P. Cool, V. Malone. Destitution—J. Mayall, John Fleenings and W. M. Boon.

Foreign Mission-T.C. Ford, W.M. Dewitt and H. A. Morgan.

Sabbath Schools-N. W. Melton, W. W. Duncan, M. G. Brewer.

Publications-J. E. Rhea, W. W. Horton, A. Bradley.

Finance-B. F. Barnes, Joe Jones, W. P. Melton.

Temperance-W. T. Noland, L. Box, S. A. Neal.

On motion, Elders W. P. Gillam, Thos. Moody and J. M. Hart were received as corresponding messengers from Russell-ville Association, Wm. Brundridge, from Little Red River; W. C. Smith, from Peede. The following were appointed for correspondence: Russellville Association, which meets on Friday before the first Sunday in October, 1887, J. Mayall, M. F. Caperton, H. W. Melton and J. E. Rhea. Little Red River, John Fleming, W. M. Dewitt, S. A. Neal. Green Briar, B. M. Stephens, B. Beardon, G. W. Ford. Peede Association, T. C. Ford, J. K. Broadaway, R. B. Edwards, M. G. Brewer.

On motion, went into election of delegates to State Convention which resulted in the election of B. H. Bearden, B. M. Stephens, J. Mayall, H. W. Melton and J. K. Broadaway.

On motion, it was voted that the meeting of this body be on Friday before the second Sunday in September, 1888, with the church at Lone Grove, 13 miles south of Morrilton. Elder B. M. Stephens to preach the introductory, Elder J. K. Brondaway, alternate.

Treasurer's report read and referred to Special Committee; also report of Executive referred to same committee, which consisted of W. L. Wolverton, John Flemmings and John Norwood.

On motion, adjourned to meet for business at 8 o'clock A. M. to-morrow. Prayer by B. H. Bearden.

Stand filled at 7 P. M. by R. B. Edwards and B. F. Barnes Saturday morning at 8 o'clock.

Met at 8 o'clock A, M., J. K. Broadaway in the chair. Prayer by J. E. McCool.

Report on Ministerial Education read and adopted. (See report A.)

Report on Destitution read and adopted. (Report B.)

Report on Foreign Missions read and adopted. (Report C.)

Treasurer's report re-submitted and adopted. (Report D.)

Report on Sabbath Schools adopted. (Report E.)

Report on Publication read, discussed and amended by adding Tennessee Baptist and Baptist Flag. (Report F.)

Report on Finance read and adopted. (Report G.)

Report on Temperance read and after warm discussion, an amendment was offered to strike out the clause of "withdrawn fellowship from them." On vote the amendment was lost and the original was adopted. (Report II.)

On motion a committee of five was appointed to report on

the propriety of taking Bro. B. F. Barnes and M. F. Caperton as beneficiaries of this Association.

G. W. Ford, E. A. Wolverton, H. C. Emmerson, J. E. Rhes and John Norwood were appointed as above committee.

A collection was taken up for foreign missions, which amounted to \$2.90 in cash and \$4.00 in pledges. (Clerk's statement I.)

On motion adjourned for preaching by Bro. J. M. Hart. Prayer by Elder T. Moody.

#### AFTERNOON SESSION.

Met for business at 2 o'clock P. M., J. K. Broadaway in the chair. Report of Special Committee on Ministerial Education read and adopted. (Report J.)

Report of Special Committee on Domestic Mission Work for the past year read and adopted. (Report K.)

A collection was taken up to pay the claim of Bro. J. Mayall, which caim amounted to \$36.50. The collection amounted to \$37.00 in pledges and fifty cents in cash.

A collection was taken up for the benefit of Elder C. Maxwell, an aged Minister. Collection amounted to \$2.80, and was turned over to Elder D. F. Knight.

Report of Elder J. K. Broadaway as Missionary was read and adopted. (Report L.)

On motion, E. A. Wolverton, M. G. Brewer, B. F. Jones and W. P. Melton were elected an Executive Board for the next year.

Motion carried that the Clerk superintend the printing and distribution of the Minutes of this meeting.

On motion the money, amounting to \$21.60, was turned over to the Clerk to pay for printing these minutes and for his service as clerk.

On motion it was voted that we have no missionary for the next year.

It was voted that this Association raise \$25 00 to assist Pleasant Grove Church in securing a Pastor.

On motion, it was voted this Association have no Missionary for the present year.

The committee on Queries reported two Queries: No. I. Has a church the right to receive a member having two wives? Answer: Each church should be the judge of its membership.

No. II. Should a Baptist Church receive members, by recommendation, from the Hard Shell Baptist Church? Answer: No. Resolved. That the thanks of the Association be tendered to the people of this vicinity for the hospitable manner in which its members have been entertained during its session at Ccdar Creek Church.

On motion, the Association adjourned. A hymn was sung, and the parting hand was taken in the best of feeling.
